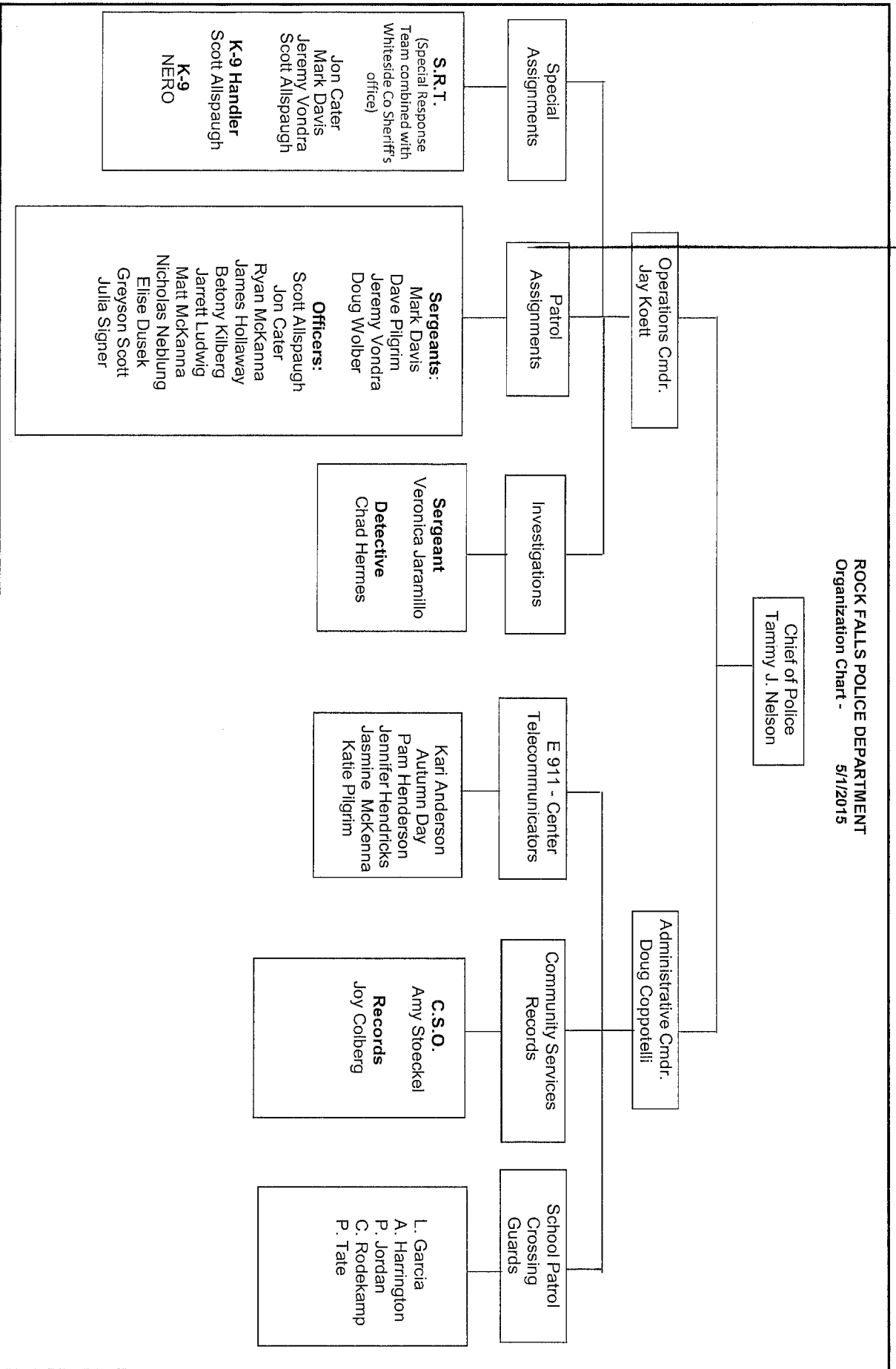

The Patrol division falls under the supervision of Operations Commander Jay Koett and is comprised of four Sergeants and 12 Patrol Officers. Patrol is divided into 4 shifts, 2 of which work dayshift and 2 nightshift. Patrol Officers work 12 hour shifts which rotate 6am and 6pm. Patrol Officers conduct investigation, collect evidence, arrest offenders, prepare written reports and testify in court.

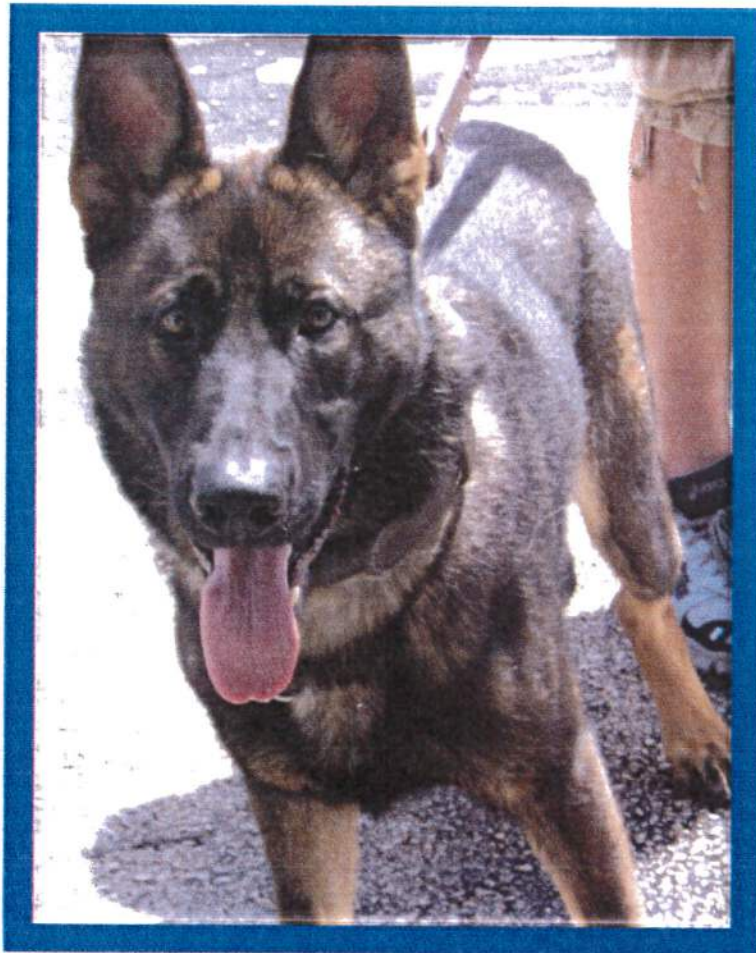

The Rock Falls Police Department utilizes a canine that is fully trained in search, apprehension, officer protection, and



narcotic detection. Our K-9's name is NERO, and his handler is Officer Scott Allspaugh. They have been partners since 2015, and they spend a great deal of time training to maintain maximum level of efficiency as a team. Along with their patrol duties, Nero and Ofc. Allspaugh provide K-9 Demonstrations and education to Community groups, Schools, daycares, city festivities, and other organizations as time would provide in their busy schedules. Officer Allspaugh recently took the K-9 detail that was once assigned to Sgt. Jeremy Vondra. Sgt. Vondra and Nero worked together for five years.

K-9 YEAR END REPORT

2015

In October of 2015, Nero and I began patrolling together as the Rock Falls Police Department K-9 Team. From October through the end of the year, Nero was called upon a total of 26 times, with several of these deployments being assists for other nearby police agencies. In total, Nero was called upon for 22 free air sniffs of vehicles, 1 track of an armed suspect, 1 track of a missing suicidal subject, and 2 school searches.

The calls that Nero assisted with resulted in 10 arrests. Among the items seized in these arrests were approximately 102g of cannabis (36.7g of this being a THC "wax" substance), and 2.3g of cocaine. 5 items of paraphernalia relating to the use of cannabis were also seized.

I am greatly looking forward to improving our skills and abilities over the upcoming year. I have very high expectations for Nero and myself, and I am very confident that we will meet and exceed these expectations.

SPECIALIZED TRAINING

ALICE TRAINING

A PROACTIVE RESPONSE TO A MAN MADE THREAT

Due to State budget restrictions and cuts, Rock Falls Police Department frequently sends Officers to training that is a “train the trainer” type training which allows this Officer to share the training with the entire Department and other Departments, schools, or organizations.

The ALICE training was one such example. Sergeant David Pilgrim was sent to this training and is now a certified instructor to apply the training to Officers and School officials. The ALICE program stands for Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate. The purpose is to prepare individuals to handle the threat of an active Shooter and to participate in their own survival, while leading others to safety. Though no one can guarantee success in this type situation, this new set of skills will greatly increase the odds of survival should anyone face this form of disaster.

Sergeant Pilgrim has begun implementing this program in Rock Falls local schools and Rock Falls City Offices.

L O.C.K.U.P. TRAINING

ARREST AND CONTROL MANEUVERS AND DE-ESCALATION

Detective Chad Hermes was sent to LOCKUP training and was given the skills to train our Officers on the valuable techniques he learned. The LOCKUP program teaches arrest and control maneuvers for all levels of physical resistance and aggression. With a primary focus on techniques for UNARMED police combat. The result is that police personnel can better protect themselves and the public they are sworn to serve.

TRAINING SCHOOL DETAIL/DRILLS

The Rock Falls Police Department has implemented a new SCHOOL DETAIL Program, in an ongoing effort to keep our schools safe. The program consists of daytime school visits to all of the local schools periodically throughout any given week. Rock Falls Officers are required to spend at least 20 minutes a week in a school, and will visit every school before repeating. This detail is department wide, which means not only the Sergeants and Patrolman, but all investigators, Commanders, dispatchers, and the Chief will participate in this detail. We implemented the program a year ago and the success of this program is already evident. Not only are the Officers and dispatchers familiarizing themselves with the inner and outer areas of the schools, they are also getting to know the staff better. On any given week, there is an average of nine officers in the schools a week. The checks are meant to be random, so don't be surprised if you see Officers walking in and around the schools at any given time.

In addition to this detail, the Rock Falls Police Department participates with each school for "Lockdown drills". These drills consist of the school calling a "Code Red", and the school practicing their lockdown procedures with Police Personnel present. Rock Falls Police also have two training sessions a year, dealing with active shooter training.

The Rock Falls Police Department takes the safety of our schools and children very seriously. We would like to thank the following schools for making this program a success – **Merrill, Dillon, East Coloma, Thome, St.Andrews, Montmorency, RF middle school, and RF High School.**

ADMINISTRATIVE HEARING/ORDINANCE

The City of Rock Falls has adopted an Administrative Adjudication Process as an alternative to Circuit Court. This process allows appeal of a wide range of municipal Ordinance complaints. All hearings are held at the Rock Falls City council chambers, on the third Tuesday of every month starting at 8am. They are intended to expedite resolutions, reduce litigation expenses, and allow the Circuit Court to focus on more serious allegations.

An Administrative Hearing is a civil (not a criminal) proceeding. Persons found liable through an adjudication process may only be fined and /or ordered to comply with the City Code. Under the Administrative Hearing system an Administrative Hearing Officer determines if ordinance citations are valid. The following list contains the types of cases that may be heard in an Administrative Adjudication Process:

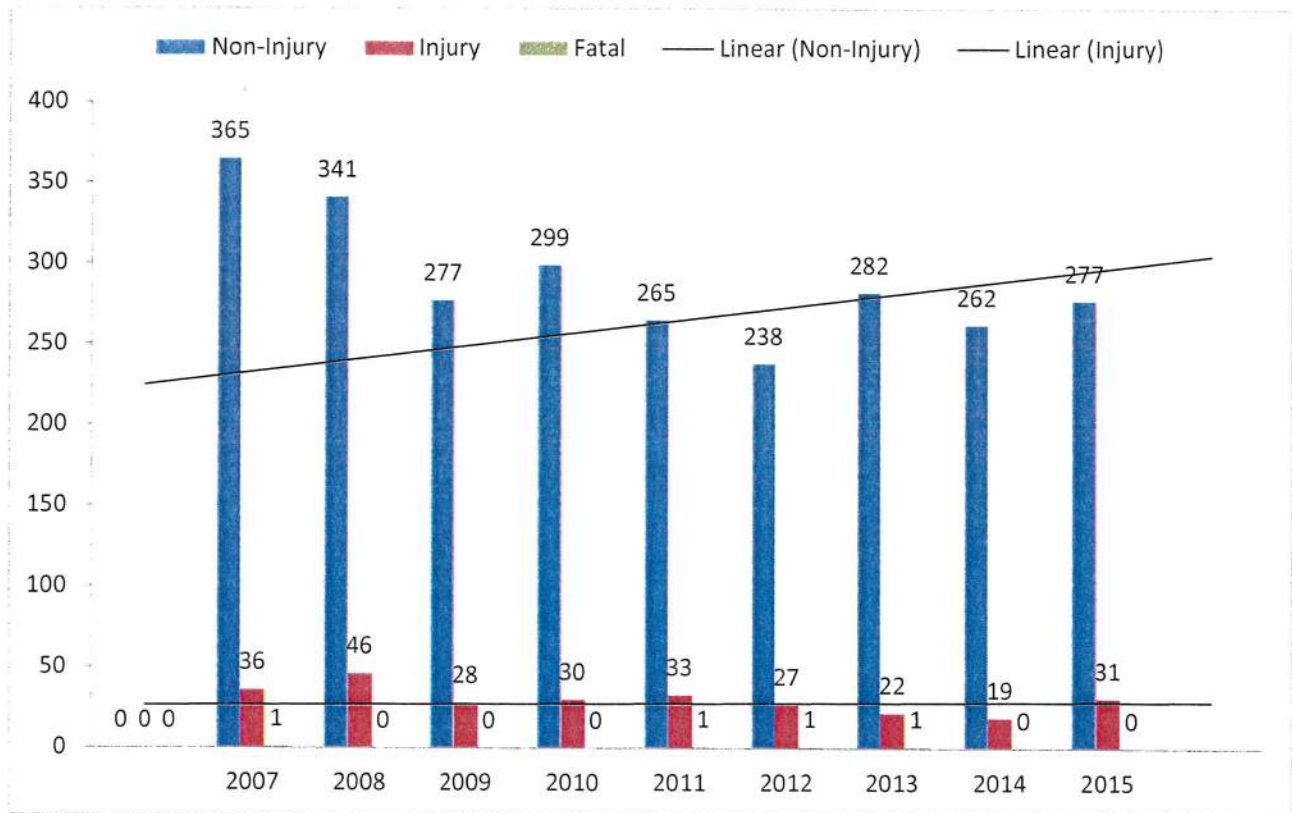

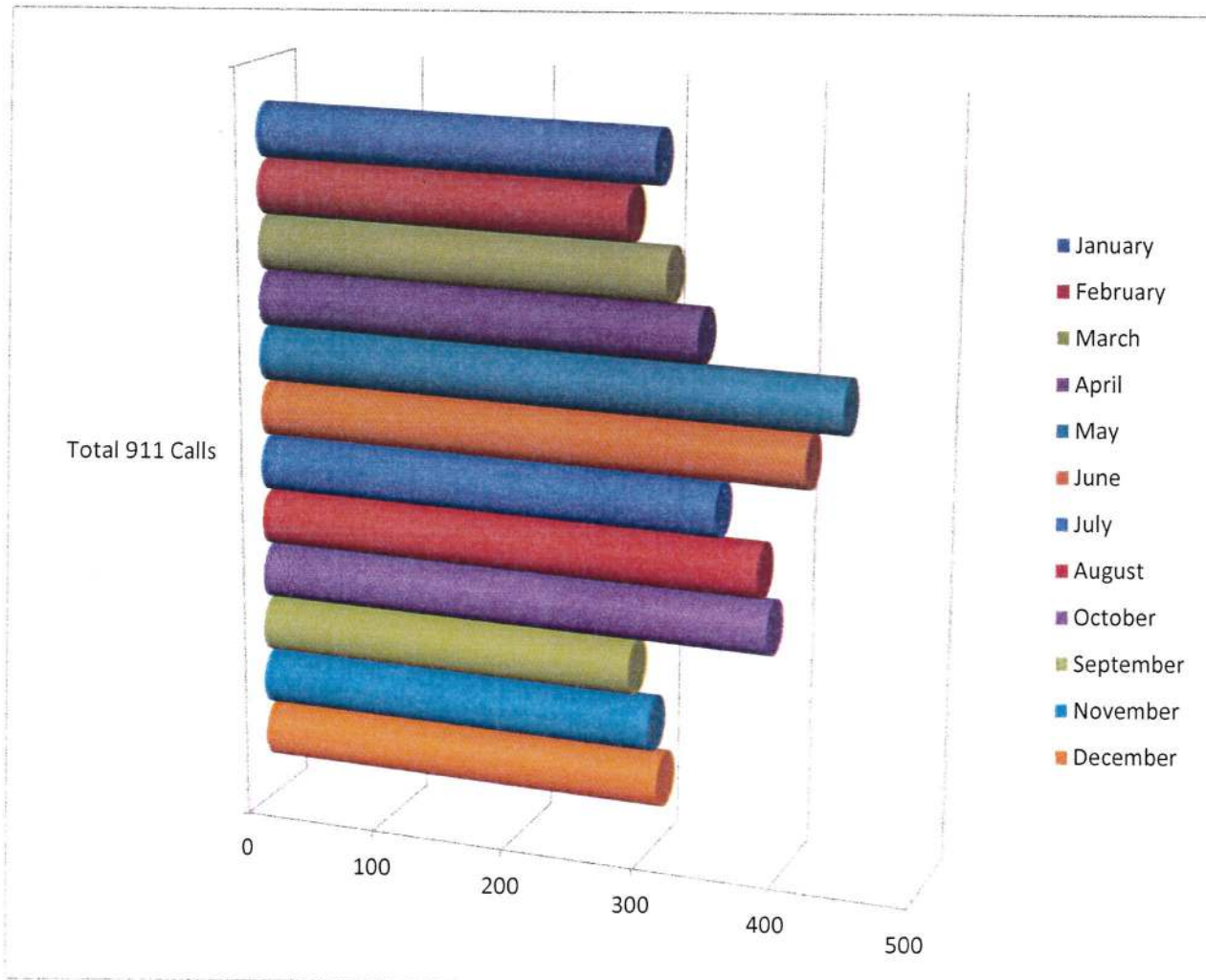

YEAR END REPORT

In 2015 the Rock Falls Police Department responded to 21,019 "calls for service", of those, 308 were motor vehicle accidents. The Department also received 4,082 Emergency 911 calls.

In comparison in 2014 the "calls for service" totaled 19,447, of those, 281 were motor vehicle accidents. In 2014 the department received a total of 4,954 emergency 911 calls.

We are currently down one patrol officer and will hire a new recruit in March of 2016. He will hopefully be trained and on his own by late August 2016.

Training was down this year because of the State's budget crisis, which resulted in the Mobile Training Unit not being able to offer classes as their budget was severely restricted. We hope to enter the new year with more ongoing training.

The future outlook is to aggressively pursue the drug problem within our city and we have taken several proactive steps to counter the problem. With a rise in Heroin overdoses we are currently looking into proactive programs such as "Safe Passage Initiative", which gives local Heroin addicts the tools for getting recovery help. This program is up and running in Lee County and we are working on plans to hopefully get it up and running in Whiteside County. We also are taking more aggressive approaches to going after those selling this highly addictive drug.

We continue to utilize our Police Department Facebook page. This interaction with the public has brought a lot of positive feedback as we continually look at ways to better connect with the public we serve.
